## **STATE OF HATE**

As we entered 2023, antisemitism, hate crimes and extremist incidents were already at historically high levels. And then October 7th happened. The predictable escalation of antisemitic incidents in the U.S., animated by violence in Israel, has been alarmingly palpable - as the numbers reflect below.

## **ADL'S SIGNIFICANT IMPACT**

#### **Investigate & Research**

ADL monitors, exposes and disrupts extremist threats. Our research is a critical tool for law enforcement to better understand, investigate and prevent hate crimes.

- ADL Midwest has recorded nearly 800 incidents to date. We will likely surpass last year's record of 962.
- ADL released its "Hate in the Prairie State" report on October 3, 2023, revealing a 111% increase in white supremacist propaganda distribution in 2022 over 2021 in Illinois.

#### **Educate & Train**

ADL is one of the largest providers of educational programming to schools and law enforcement. In the last year, ADL Midwest has:

- Reached nearly 150,000 K-12 students and educators with anti-bias programming and 12,000+ high school students with antisemitism education.
- Provided 1.000+ law enforcement officers with hate crimes, extremism and inclusive policing education.
- Impacted almost 9,000 employees, young leaders, religious congregants, civic leaders, community members and legislators with antisemitism and anti-hate programming.

### Advocate & Assist

ADL engages diverse coalitions, corporations, elected officials and the public to join us in fighting hate for good. In 2023, ADL Midwest:

- Authored anti-doxing legislation, which unanimously passed through the Illinois General Assembly and was signed into law by Governor Pritzker.
- Convened 50+ civil rights organizations to participate in ADL Midwest's Anti-Hate Table.
